Review of the updated paper on linkages between the TNA and NDC process

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- TNA process should be seen one of several project implementation stages/steps that a well thought project design and implementation should have.
- Technology, and thus TNA is:
 - a) One of the means of implementation, and therefore a means to an end, and not an end in itself.
 - b) Identifying the technology needed for the implementation of a project or a specific NDC action is critical decision making point in NDC project design and implementation. It is a very important ingredient for NDC implementation and should therefore not be done in isolation.
 - c) TNA be seen in the same light as other indispensable stages in bankable project development, viz feasibility studies, including financial engineering, environmental impact assessments, stakeholder engagement/consultation, capacity needs assessment, legal and regulatory assessment, risk management strategies, and should be mainstreaming in to project design and implementation.
 - d) The **timing** of the TNA is therefore very crucial to inform the implementation of climate change policies, measures and actions



Addressing common TNA approach

- TNA process approach, in addressing technologies, should be considered "a means to an end and not an end in itself"- should be considered together with finance and capacity building.
- The TAPs be considered to be a medium to long term plans for uptake of technologies, which could be linked to sectoral action plans which are the channels for implementation. TAP are technology pathways
- Some steps in the TNA process are very relevant and should be recommended as good practice in the elaboration of implementation plans for the NDC and of national actions. For example:
 - Identification of national priority sectors and technologies,
 - Assessing technologies via analysis against national development priorities,
 - Potential for GHG reduction and Vulnerability reduction,
 - Cost and benefits,
 - Barrier analysis and enabling framework, and
 - Economic assessment of measures to transfer and diffuse prioritized technologies.



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
